Introduction: In today's gospel reading, Jesus asks the disciples who people think he is. We will be reflecting on what their answer means.

Gospel Reading: Mark 8:27-38

Reflection: A question for you to answer. Jesus: who do you think he is? You may have been taught the correct theological answer, but that is based on what someone else thought, many centuries ago. The question is "Who is Jesus to you, personally?" It is interesting to read in today's Gospel that initially Jesus asked the disciples who were people saying he was. So he received someone else's opinion

in response. But then Jesus asked what they themselves thought. Apparently, only Peter had his own opinion and came out with it. You are the Messiah.

Then Jesus warned them not to talk about it. He went on to quote some of the scriptures which predicted the Messiah would experience rejection leading to execution. But there was good news as well. The Messiah would come alive again in three days. That was evidently not the kind of Messiah that Peter was thinking of and told Jesus so. But Jesus put him right on the matter. If that was what God had decided, only Satan would try to spoil his plans.

Let's return to the question of who Jesus is to you personally. What is our relationship with him? Perhaps we think of him as God, part of the Godhead. Maybe we regard him as a friend, like I do, guiding our thoughts and actions through life. If help is needed, we can think about Christmas church services. There are many readings from the Old Testament taken as prophecies of God's son being sent to Earth for our benefit.

One in particular is Isaiah chapter 53 which speaks of Israel's suffering through conquest and exile in Babylon, referring to the people of God as a man – "he". The man, known as the "Suffering Servant", has been identified as Jesus because of the nature of the sufferings described.

Another well-known Christmas reading is Isaiah 7:14 *"The Lord himself will give you a sign. A young woman will conceive and give birth to a son who will be called Immanuel."* However, this is an extract from a prophecy about a military threat. The conception, birth and weaning of a child is a pictorial description of the timescale for the threat to be resolved.

Our New Testament reading from the letter of James starts with a warning to teachers to be careful what they say. They will be judged more strictly than the rest of us. Having been warned, I am being very careful what I say about who Jesus was and is. The New Testament contains some important ideas about who Jesus really is. Amongst the notable ones are Gospels picturing God giving him the title "Son of God". Mark 1:10-11 describes Jesus being baptised by his cousin John in the river Jordan *"Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.'" Mark 9:7 comes from an account of Jesus with Peter, James and John on a mountain with Jesus talking with Moses and Elijah, <i>"Then a cloud appeared and covered them, and a voice came from the cloud: 'This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!'"* The first chapter of John's Gospel echoes those words *"Listen to him"* when it describes Jesus as the embodiment of God's word in human form.

St. Paul's letter to the Christians in Phillipi, chapter two verses 5-11 is usually interpreted as portraying Jesus as the "Second Adam". Like Adam in the creation story, even though he was made in God's likeness, unlike Adam, he did not think of having equality with God. On the contrary, being no more than a man, he took the role of servant, and his humility made him obedient – even as far as being crucified.

Therefore, God exalted him and gave him the name (Son of God) superior to all others so (vv10-11) "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

Whatever our own thoughts about who Jesus is, there are plenty of ideas to go on – Jewish Messiah, God's Son, Redeemer, Saviour, Lord, Word made flesh, Suffering Servant, Priest and King, teacher about God's kingdom, friend. The trap to avoid is to imagine there is only one answer. Is that too confusing? Remember, it's what he means to us personally that counts.

Pause for thought:

Prayer of thanksgiving: To some you are comfortable words in times of sorrow or need to others, a teacher dying for what he believes. To some you are nothing more than a purveyor of magic tricks. But to us you are this world's creator, this world's saviour, the breath of life sustaining us each day, to whom we raise our hearts and souls in ever grateful thanks. Amen. From the Act of Prayer
